All proceeds from the event got Veteran's Inc. Although a final figure hasn't been released yet, this year's event is expected to have raised more than \$75,000, well exceeding last year's total.

Rig of the Month

YJ 88/92

Rig Name: Don't have one.

Make, model, year: Frame and body are from a rust-free '88. Running gear is from my original '92.

Forum name: NHDCOYE

Wildest adventure: My wildest adventures have occurred at Rauch Creek as there is so much terrain available to play on. My most memorable came one day at an obstacle named "shoot the moon". We arrived to watch a V8 buggy style Wagoneer on 44's repeatedly attempt to climb the obstacle, only to slide off one way or another. He finally stopped when he managed to remove the front clip from the Jeep. As always, I decided to dip my toe in the water just to see how far I might be able to make it, never assuming I would even get halfway...

I selected my line and went for it, barely managing to get my front wheel onto the first of two ledges. I backed down a bit and shifted left a little and went for it again. To my surprise, I managed to raise the front wheels two feet in the air and, before I knew it, I catapulted to the second ledge and was perched about 6-8 feet high on at a 40' angle. Foot on brakes, legs shaking, and my heart beating thru my chest, I knew I did not want to back down. With encouragement from my crew, I carefully crawled to the top of the ledge and made it over. I still remember the feeling of elation of making it over that obstacle.



Mods: Started off as a bone stock 1992 YJ in the summer of 2005. I added a 3" lift to fit what I thought were huge 33" baja claws and began wheeling open diffs. I trashed the original Dana 30 and went for a cheapo 4:10 upgrade by replacing the axles with a set from a 4Cyl Jeep along with a SYE transfer case mod and new rear driveshaft. I later added a Lock Rite lunchbox locker (\$199) to the

front and was amazed at the improvement off-road.

Over the years I wore out the 3/16 skid plates and have since upgraded to 1/4 steel which are holding up much better. The front-locker-first approach taught me to look differently at lines over obstacles than most.

Next was a junk yard Ford 8.8 which provided a "free" disc brake upgrade. I chose to go spring over in the rear which got ań Aussie lunchbox locker installed. I was truly surprised by the newfound traction and proceeded to flop on my first run with the locked rear. Sorry to say it was not on a tough obstacle but a Class VI run ...



The stock Dana 30 blew up

and I installed a used Dana 30 with 4:56's and 30 spline alloy axles with ARB air locker I found for sale on the side of the road. I re-geared the rear to match, and this is the setup I still run today.

With each mod the heap was able to conquer bigger and better obstacles and manage to get stuck far better (worse) than ever before...



Who does the primary work: I do my own.

Major damage: Exploded Dana 30 front diff, worn thru rear diff, cracked transfer case, shatter rear yokes, broken (rusted) front spring mount, ripped off rear tire carrier and a few bent windshields.

Dream mod: Would love to add a V8 and upgraded drive train to match. (i.e. Buggie)

Anything else: I am always amazed at the member support and willingness to lend a hand when needed without hesitation. This creates a family atmosphere where learning is encouraged which I believe makes this club exceptional in the sport.
